Permits? Professional? Do it Myself?

Greetings neighbors!! This month I have been asked to address basic home remodeling and upgrade issues. When do I need a permit? Can I do it myself? When should I consult a professional?

With the growing popularity of the "Do it Yourself (DIY)" suppliers, their workshops and the interest of many homeowners to work on their own properties, many people want to know what guidelines they should follow.

Depending on the scope of the project, you may or may not need to get a permit from the city. Projects such as the following should always be permitted:

Any new structure permanently attached to the house (decks, arbors, overhead storage, etc.)

When in doubt, you should always contact the Building and Planning Department at the City and inquire as to whether or not your planned project requires a permit.

There are many things you can do around your home that do not require permits such as replacing the toilet, sinks, faucets, painting, replacing floor covering, replacing tile, installing shutters, etc.

Always remember that there may be hazardous materials (asbestos, lead paint, mold, etc.) that may require special handling.

You, as a homeowner are well within your rights to do your own work, provided you have the skills and feel comfortable enough to tackle the job. Or, if you are to hire out for the work, regardless of whether you have a permit job or not, you should always contract with licensed professional.

Some homeowners like to try and manage projects of a larger scale and act as their own "General Contractor" and coordinate all the various sub trades, material deliveries, etc. This can be quite an overwhelming process and might be better left to a General Contractor, whose job it is to make sure your project runs smoothly and with all the scheduling, etc., left as transparent to you as possible. You might pay a little more, but you, as a homeowner have better protection, should problems arise, dealing with one entity and not trying to run down any of the sub-contractors who may have created the problem. When that happens, there is usually a lot of "finger pointing" and resolution can be quite difficult and a very lengthy process.

Always check references and obtain multiple bids when hiring anyone to work on your home.

As long as you do your due diligence in regard to upgrading/improving your property, the remodeling process should be a rewarding (although sometimes complicated) experience

SONA Residents Joing Anti-Littering and Anti-Graffiti Efforts

At a recent SONA meeting residents signed up for volunteer slots in both the anti-graffiti and anti-littering volunteer programs run by the city of San Jose. By donating a few hours a week SONA residents assist in keeping our neighborhood cleaner and safer. Removing litter is easy, improves the looks of the neighborhood and makes people think twice about throwing trash around. Reporting graffiti means the City can send crews out quickly. This reduces the visual blight and also discourages taggers. Because much of the graffiti is gang-related this also serves as a deterrent to more gang activity. Here's some information from the City's website:



The City's Anti-Graffiti Program (AGP) has three components:

Eradication: The eradication team is responsible for removing graffiti from both public and private property. Call the Anti-Graffiti HOTLINE (408) 277-2758 24-hours a day to report graffiti in San Jose.

Enforcement: The enforcement team is responsible for upholding the City of San Jose Municipal code for graffiti. Code violations, educating the public and surveillance efforts are offered. The enforcement team works with SJPD to accomplish these goals.

Community Involvement: The community involvement team is responsible for educating the residents on the effects of graffiti and how they can receive free supplies for becoming a volunteer. Currently there are 4,000 graffiti and Litter volunteers working to beautify the City of San Jose.



Anti-Graffiti Program (AGP)

The results of the 5th annual survey once again showed a city-wide decrease (40%) in graffiti. Totals for the last few years are:

January 1999	71,541
January 2000	35,744
January 2001	10,498
January 2002	5,612
January 2003	3,827

This means the overall reduction from 1999 is 95%!!!

Why do People Litter? They feel no ownership or sense of pride about their community. They believe somebody else will pick it up and it's not their responsibility. Litter has already accumulated in a spot, and "no one will notice another piece of litter there". Lack of convenient trash and recycling cans, or unwillingness to use available trash cans. Some don't see that litter is an important environmental and community concern. For some smokers, it has become an "accepted norm" to throw used cigarette butts on the ground. Here's some information on how long it takes some products to break down:

- Orange peels - 6 months
- Paper - 2-5 months
- Cigarette Butts - 1-12 YEARS
- Plastic Bags - 10-20 YEARS
- Aluminum Cans - 80-100 YEARS
- Glass Bottles - 1 MILLION YEARS
- Plastic Bottles - NEVER!!!!

Keep Our Curbs and Sidewalks Clear

Our neighborhood is in constant motion with people using streets and sidewalks. Many of our pedestrians use strollers, walkers and wheelchairs. Sidewalks and gutters in our neighborhood need to be kept clear for a number of reasons; safety, easy pedestrian access and drainage are just a few of the issues. So, here are a few reminders:



Yard Waste: When piling up trimmings from your yard, remember that yard waste should be in piles that are no larger than 5'x5'x5' with a 5' space in between piles. Spacing is necessary to allow the trucks to grab the entire pile. All piles of yard waste should be placed beyond the gutter line to allow rain water to drain cleanly **Move debris out of gutters!**

Do not park in gutters! down the street. This allows the water to be as clean as possible before draining into the creek system and keeps the vents from clogging up.



Parked Cars: Much of our neighborhood has sloped curbsides. These are not designed for you to park your cars on the slope. All vehicles should be parked outside of the gutter/drain lines. This allows water to drain easily down the street and also opens the sidewalk for pedestrians. Treat the sloped curbs as if they were the straight-edged kind and stay out of the sidewalk area. **Shrubs blocking sidewalk and sign.**



Hedges: Trim hedges back from the sidewalk. This allows people...especially those with strollers, walkers or wheelchairs...full access to the sidewalk. Keeping the hedges from growing around signs at all times. People can't read what they can't see and the restrictions of the signs can't be enforced if signs are hidden from sight.

Supervisor Jim Beall Holds Community Meeting

Several dozen people attended a February 16 meeting at Luther Burbank Elementary School to listen to Supervisor Jim Beall update them on current projects. As many have noticed, the first phase of the Bascom Avenue improvements between Highway 280 and West San Carlos have begun. This will include a median island and enhanced pedestrian crossing. Further improvements will include sidewalks and gutters in this area to make walking much easier. Much of this space has been used for parking.

Infrastructure programs include enhancing the drainage in the Buena Vista area (across 280 from us) and working with the City of San Jose to install consistent sidewalks, curbs and gutters along Scott Street from Bascom through Douglas and Willard to Meridian.

The new Vasona Corridor light rail line is on track to open later this year. Neighbors have spotted trains running down the track to test the line. This also allows them to align tracks before the line is officially opened. Sup. Beall promised a celebration and "...a week of free rides.." when the line opens.

Don't forget the annual Pancake Breakfast to be held at the Campbell Community Center on Saturday, April **xx**, 2005 at 9am. Enjoy a free breakfast, meet your neighbors and talk to your supervisor about issues in your neighborhood.

MICAP PROGRAM CAN HELP YOU SAVE ENERGY DOLLARS

MICAP (Moderate Income Comprehensive Attic Program) was the focus of our January meeting. This program is funded by the CUPC (California Public Utilities Program) and provides no cost insulation and energy saving measures to low and moderate income families. You don't have to own your own home to qualify for this program and if you are a landlord, qualification is based on your tenant's income.

All weatherization work is performed at no cost for program participants. Work included in this program includes a free energy assessment and installation includes:


