Our Master Gardeners presentation is a great time for anybody to bring general or specific questions about what goes on in your yard to an expert. The Santa Clara County Master Gardener program trains volunteers in all aspects of gardening. From designing a landscape to planting a vegetable garden, choosing trees, developing a backyard habitat or just trying to figure out what's eating your plants, these are the experts to call on and we'll have one available at our next meeting. Master Gardeners go through an extensive educational and training process and graduate after they complete a service project. They work to establish gardens in schools and nursing homes, conduct corporate outreach, run demonstration gardens and operate seasonal plant sales among other things. Master Gardeners operate a free hotline and can help you identify pests, choose a landscaper or steer you towards that perfect pepper plant. Learn more about the program or learn more about what's going on in your own backyard by attending our next meeting.

Friends of Bascom Library and Community Center are still working hard to identify alternatives that will allow our local site to be opened. Recent budget discussions still show the local site as being closed and the recent message from the Mayor indicates that this could be a long term "solution" to assisting in our city's budget crisis. So, while you are still expected to continue paying the bills, unless something changes, there will be no attempt made to open any of the facility. The Friends group meets the first Saturday of each month. You can find a schedule of meetings on our website, contact Marlene or join the Friends of Bascom Facebook group. Strategies are being developed and there are committees working on different components. A recent McClatchy News article (April 19, 2011) highlighted the Bascom Library site and the Friends of Bascom in an article addressing the national impact of reducing library funding. Other local facilities have remained open and new sites have been opened due largely to the impact of local residents making demands. If this is important to you, find out more on our website or attend the next meeting on Saturday May 7th at 10:30am in the Community Room at the Rose Garden Branch Library.

SONA is wondering if there are enough people out in the 'hood with produce to generate a produce exchange or produce give away. Do you have fruit trees that produce more than you need or want? Want to swap or take advantage of somebody else's extras? Who winds up with a load of zucchini, tomatoes or other produce during the summer? If you are interested, contact a board member.

Spring cleaning often means a lot of yard waste out on the street. We all have those times when we generate a lot of extra for trash day, but just because the rainy season is (hopefully) coming to an end, that doesn't mean you should ignore where exactly you place the materials. Make sure that you keep the gutter portion of the street clear. Even if it's not raining, neighbors are washing cars, testing new sprinkler systems and that often means water running down the street. Yard waste should not be swept along into the drainage system.

The neighborhoods with "rolled" or soft curbs have a request: Keep the cars and trucks off of the curb and sidewalk areas. For some reason, people think that those soft curbs are there to help keep cars off the streets. Cars belong on the streets, not blocking sidewalks and making it difficult for pedestrians, especially those with children or those who are disabled, to get through the neighborhood. Please regard these curbs just the same as a standard curb and gutter and keep all wheels in the street. If you don't pull up onto the sidewalk by jumping a curb, you shouldn't. If you have gardeners or contractors, remind them as well because it has created a safety issue along some of our blocks. We don't want pedestrians in the street.

San Jose Police Activity Mayor's Gang Task Force

Our thanks to Lt. Michael Knox and members of the Mayors Gang Task Force for coming to our April 2011 meeting. The recent murder at the McDonalds on Bascom at Fruitdale, the subsequent school lockdown and other issues were discussed at length.

While schools were placed on lockdown status, nearby residents were not informed of the situation and had no idea that SJPD was looking for suspects. Routing of traffic during this incident and during other accidents or crimes was thoroughly discussed. Because we are adjacent to busy streets and the county hospital, SONA residents want to work with SJPD to ensure future incidents are handled with care regarding the "downstream" affects.

The ongoing problems for creek side residents were brought up and residents were able to speak to SJPD after the meeting. Residents continue to be stymied by the multiple jurisdictions (SJ Water Company along the creek, SJPD on the street) and the ongoing criminal activity without ongoing follow up by authorities.

Some residents reported an increase in burglaries or suspicious activity in their area, but the statistics do not reflect this trend. This means SONA residents must report all suspicious activity and crime. This is the only way SJPD will know there is a problem. Reporting people who are acting suspicious could help them identify an emerging pattern that will trigger an increase in patrols. Reporting all crimes (even if you aren't filing an insurance claim) also triggers the process of identifying a need for more police presence. When in doubt or when it's not a crime in progress or life threatening, call 311.

The shooting also triggered extra activity at Del Mar High School. The Gang Task Force staff described how they operate on a day to day basis, working with staff, parents, youth and school officials to identify potential problems and re-direct youth towards non-gang related activities. When any incident occurs that could be gang related, activity is stepped up. There is not only more police presence on campus, additional resources are brought to bear that reduce the rumors and direct youth towards appropriate expression of fear, anger or agitation. The closest youth centers are in different council districts, which means our youth are not able to participate in the organized sports leagues or other services.

SONA residents expressed appreciation for the ongoing presence of the task force and supports developing local activities for our youth. Residents also expressed support for SJPD and the benefit they continue to provide. We look forward to working with SJPD in the future.

SunWork Renewable (and Affordable!) Energy Project

Our thanks to Reuben Veek from the SunWork group for patiently waiting during our April meeting and also providing us with a great program for local low energy use homes. This non profit targets homes that do not use a lot of electricity (\$150 or so per month) and partners with trained volunteers to install solar systems on those homes. SunWork provides the entire package; surveying your home and the energy use, designing the system, handling the rebate paperwork and continuing through the installation and inspection phase until your system is up and running. You wind up with a professionally certified and installed system and lower energy bills.

While solar systems are not new, they have been expensive in the past. Costs have come down, but by combining lower costs, the non-profit and certified volunteers, SunWork has opened solar up to a new market. By providing these services at a third the standard cost, they are able to address the needs of households who might not think they can afford a solar system. For many, in this age of belt tightening, living on a limited income has often meant not being able to afford the upgrades to your home that would allow you to reduce your energy costs. Those with the greater need often have less ability to buy into a system. And, few of us want to handle the paperwork, oversee the installation or deal with the inspection process, so the one-stop shop is a great alternative.
