Recently I got a phone call from one of our SONA community members who was reporting on the "homeless encampments" along the I-280 corridor and Moorpark Ave. and the activities going on there-in. After venting his frustrations to me the question was then posed: "what are WE going to do about it?"

While SONA does a great deal to bring to the attention of local government (City of San Jose, County of Santa Clara) and various agencies (VTA and CalTrans to name just a few) we cannot do it all. So, I implore you help us out – it's easy and relatively painless.

- 1. When you see something that's not right, report it.
- 2. If you witness nefarious activity occurring, report it.
- 3. Make sure to get a report or case number from the agency and then...
- 4. Let SONA know so we can keep tabs on your report and follow-up. By documenting resident complaints we were able to escalate them recently and see the Moorpark and Parkmoor areas cleaned up.

Your efforts will have a different effect because you were the eyewitness to the activity. If we make the initial report it may lack the momentum of a first-hand witness.

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We have a new issue to deal with on an individual neighborhood basis. It seems that a number of our teens have decided that it's okay to break into empty homes in the community and have a party – complete with drugs and booze. What makes this so galling is the parents have returned with their teenagers looking for lost items (i.e. A cellphone, etc.). So...please watch your street and any property that you know is vacant should be a major focus of our attention.

SONA Prepared – May Checklist Family Communication Plan

The first thing any family can do is sit down and talk. Talk about what might happen, talk about what could happen, talk about what you can do and how you should be prepared. Your workplace has a plan, your children are drilled in any number of scenarios at school and you should have a plan for your family.

- ✓ Meet with family members. Talk about how the family plan aligns with the work and school plans. Make sure caregivers, nannies and other providers are aware of the plan.
- ✓ Choose an out of town contact. While contact in a disaster area can be difficult, it is often easier to reach outside the area to establish a communication clearing house. Make sure that your out of town contact is part of the plan, that you all have alternative ways of reaching at least one out of the area contact point. Your out of town contact should have everybody's name, date of birth, likely location, medical information, care giver information and meet up locations.
- ✓ Choose meet up locations if you are separated. Schools will automatically go into action, but where are the secondary points students might be routed to? Where can you meet if there is an emergency at home? Where will you meet if there is an emergency in the neighborhood? You should have a neighborhood location, an out of neighborhood location and know the locations for secondary evacuations from work or school.
- ✓ If there is a barrier to a family member making it to the meet up point, what are the solutions? Can your caretaker get your elderly or disabled relative to a meet up point without assistance? What are the options?
- ✓ Update all of your emergency contact lists. Include your out of town access point and include your meet up points. Make sure your out of town contact has the list of meet up sites and locations. Make sure all family members have a copy of the contacts and meet up points.
- ✓ Make sure that any special needs are listed in your contact plan. Medical conditions that require monitoring, medications and allergies should be noted.
- ✓ Plans should also take into consideration our surrounding infrastructure. With a multifreeway intersection and Valley Medical Center nearby, a major event will clog all roads and services. And don't forget that we have already experienced incidents where activity at VMC has resulted in a partial neighborhood lockdown.
- ✓ Summer is here and it's vacation time. Make sure you travel with important information that might affect you in an emergency out of town when you won't have access to your health care provider or records. Whether you are visiting a theme park, camping or at the vacation home, designate a meet up point daily if necessary. If your kids are going away to camp make sure that your out of town contact info is included in the emergency information they require.
